William D. Arbus, board member, pointed out that the bog area is valuable to biology students. He said it could never be replaced if it were destroyed by mining.

The Hanna Nickle company of Riddle is one of the major interests in the mining development. Ramp said that the low grade deposits might be a source of augmenting higher grade ore in

the Riddle area.

The board also acted in support of a BLM program of tansy ragwort weed control. Members Bob Geaney and Sam Dement explained the status of the ragwort problem and urged the board action which called for immediate action by the BLM on BLM lands, and alerted the Oregon legislative task force to the crisis.
